Forest schools is a long term project for the school which will enable us to allow children to have structured lessons outdoors and increase levels of activity within the school week. The impact of the training is that the staff member is now fully qualified and can begin implementing activities. Two basketball nets were bought for outside so that the Newcastle Eagles Club could do their activities on the yard as well as in the hall. This has enabled a long time club to be established with appropriate additional equipment to extend what they were doing inside to being able to do it outside. The impact therefore extended what the children had on offer. 	The PE Co-ordinator has gathered a raft of data on attendances of pupils at clubs and attainment in lessons. This has enabled her to accurately target the correct children and spend the sports premium wisely. Extending the Newcastle Eagles basketball provision has been essential to allow for increased attendance at this club. It can now be run inside and outside of the building. Forest School Leader training will enable our staff to engage pupils in outdoor activities. This training is the start of a strategic plan to engage our pupils in many outdoor physical activities.

The impact of using the SSP has increased participation figures but is not sustainable so our challenge is to consider how to maintain high activity levels next year. Hoops for Health (a basketball event) has been a great challenge for our children. All children have taken part in combining healthy eating with exercise. Seeing exercise as part of a healthy lifestyle package challenged our children's thinking and enhanced the basketball exercise they have taken part in. This is an event we can continue in school paying for it as part of our curriculum in the near future. The impact of the Under 11s football league membership has permitted our school to join an established local league for our children.
